Item #1. Call to order. Mayor Nelson called the meeting to order at 9:12 A.M.

Item #2. Invocation/Pledge of Allegiance. The invocation by Pastor Brad Friday was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Item #3. Mayor's Report.

Mayor Nelson spoke about the protocols around public commentary and his preference to move it from item 7 to item 3 so that the Mayor and Commissioners can address any issues brought up in public commentary via their own reports. The Commission cannot allow a back and forth commentary during the public commentary.

City Attorney advised that the Mayor organizes the agenda, and no motion or vote is required to make this change. The Mayor sought consensus from the Commission to move the Public Commentary to item #3 going forward. All commissioners agreed.

Commissioner Warrick asked to address the issue of public not getting responses to their queries/concerns during their public commentary.

Mayor Nelson advised that is the reason for his preference to moving public commentary to item #3 so that if someone asks a question, the Commission can respond in their agenda time afterwards.

Item # 7. Public Commentary (brought forward during this meeting and will be item #3 in future meetings.

Mr. Walker of 1106 Michigan Avenue – advised that as it stands right now the City does not have a Mayor Pro Tem. He said he has researched and found that the selection method in the previous days is correct and gives a good flow through giving everyone an opportunity to act as Mayor Pro Tem. He would like to request that a procedure is set up for choosing a Mayor Pro Tem, the tenure, and a rotation.

Mayor Nelson read the Mosley Baseball Team state final winners 2021 proclamation.

Head Coach Jon Hudson briefly spoke and thanked the City for the overwhelming support and celebration.

Mosley High School Headmaster thanked the Mayor, Commissioners, and City of Lynn Haven for the welcome given to the team on their arrival back. Mayor Nelson thanked City Manager and staff and all of the City of Lynn Haven who celebrated the team.

The Mayor gave a quick week in review. Time in the office on mayoral duties 4 to 5 times a week, thanking City Manager for time given to update him on the City's issues.

He met with Community Services Director to discuss a potential 3 on 3 basketball tournament coordinated with the back-to-school effort at Cain Griffin Park, hopefully on July 31st.

He joined the community in celebrating the Dolphins win on their arrival back. He went on to say

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that having a relationship with some team members, he knows that they are amazing young men as well as players.

He attended the Memorial Day Service at Kent-Forest Lawn Funeral Home & Cemetery where they had a nice display to honor our fallen soldiers.

Peace in the Park on Memorial Day weekend where he met more residents.

As mayor, when out and about, he does get some queries from the public, one of those issues he took back to the City Manager to resolve. Once again thanks to the City Manager and staff for quick responses.

He said he has reached out to FL League of Cities and Mayors, because our membership is paid but we have not been actively involved. We will now be involved and participating in these going forward.

The Mayor encouraged the City to continue to work together because “we are better together”.

Item #4. Commissioners’ Reports.

Commissioner Aldridge gave kudos to Mosley High School for their win saying it is a highlight of 2021. Everyone is working hard, and he appreciates the City’s employees for the hard work they do, taking pride in the City.

Commissioner Perno said he had recently visited St Augustine for some R&R in the last few weeks, had an opportunity to thank a police officer for the people from St Augustine that came out to help us after the storm. Met with Darryl from the Northwest Florida Water district at the St George and St Andrew Bay Estuary program and he shared a bunch of information about grants etc. and Commissioner Perno told them they needed to talk to our department heads not the Commissioners, so he set the meeting up and we have our eyes on a few grant opportunities to help build our waterways and increase vegetation and clean water around our cities. Thanked City employees for all they do. Commissioner Warrick thanked everyone for their prayers and thoughts. He said he had a meeting with City Manager yesterday for about 2 hours and found it constructive, and he learned a lot, identifying areas he needs to educate himself on, like planning. He is happy to see so many people here today and hopes all meetings will have this many people.

Commissioner Tinder said the last couple weeks were pretty busy. She had a meeting with City Manager the previous week and was working on miscellaneous projects from residents that the City Manager has taken care of. She said she tries to represent the people and when residents come to her with various issues, she may not agree with all those issues, but she is tasked with serving the residents. Over the past 2 weeks she has been barraged by people about the recent incident with Chief Ramie with regard to election tampering. She does not know what to tell people, and Attorney Obos may be able to shed light on it. She has the ethics policy on her and intends to read it. She contacted the HR director and asked if she would be here with the ethics policy. HR Director said she could get it off the website, and Kevin Obos had called later to say the Commissioners are not supposed to direct the staff activity. Commissioner Tinder clarified that the Commissioners are allowed to talk to City employees but cannot direct them. Kevin Obos confirmed. Commissioner Tinder stated that the entire City is run solely by one person, being the City Manager, stating that her main concern is that the people are losing faith in policies and politics. Commissioner Tinder proceeded to read the employee ethics policy. Attorney Obos stated that the first amendment rights of any member of this country including public officials and public employees allows one to voice opinion on political issues, as long as it is not in an official capacity. The first amendment rights trump any employee policy. Any disciplinary action in this case will be violating the first amendment rights of the Chief. That is the law.

Item #5. City Manager’s Report.

- A. Financial Update** – Ms. Roman asked if there were questions. There were none.
- B. Employee of the Month** – City Manager invited Gloria Thompson to introduce Karin Pfuntner and speak about her achievements. Ms. Thompson thanked Karin and presented her

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with the Employee of the Month plaque.

The City Manager spoke about starting up the Farmer's Market again from about July 22nd with more info to follow.

City Manager advised we are entering Phase 2 of the Legislative paving, which is out for bid on June 28th, and scheduled to pave about 4.3miles.

Bid opening for repairs of Fire Station #1 is on 15th at 2pm.

The new ladder truck will be in very soon, as voted in by the commission previously.

City Manager advised the City is sending letters to business owners on HW 77 and 390 asking them to keep their properties and the areas around their properties clean and tidy.

Some upgrades are happening to the bark park, thanks to Ty.

Great amount of activity at our parks as schools close for summer.

Scheduled LH Bayou Park & Preserve opening on Tuesday June 29th at 9am – all public invited to attend.

Our banners are in to cover Ohio Ave, Hw77 and Florida and will soon be calling for our hometown heroes for banners next month.

Also, the basketball tournament that the Mayor spoke about is an exciting opportunity for us to get underway.

The City Manager noted that she had made a Check for Tetrtech for \$23,913.00

Update on the reason the City Hall is not demolished yet is that before we start any of the FEMA projects, even though it has been approved by FEMA, and we are in agreement of the status, it goes back to FEMA now for final clearance. It is currently in tribal review for 30 days and as soon as that is complete, we will begin the Demolition.

Commissioner Tinder asked if the farmers market is going to be where it was before? City Manager confirmed yes.

Commissioner Tinder – City Hall demolition will ensure the front part will remain intact and the back part where you can see the back of the building, is the only part being demolished? City Manager confirmed yes.

Item #6. City Attorney's Report. Legal Counsel, Mr. Obos spoke about the Bayou Park & Preserve – last meeting we approved the acceptance agreement.

Several years ago, there was a grant and maintenance agreement. As part of the donation agreement once that is complete the deed is given back to the City. Once the City has that deed recorded the maintenance responsibility falls to the City, with \$3.5m in maintenance grant funds that we claim as we spend on the maintenance of the preserve. As part of the contract the park had included a year of landscaping maintenance which they are 2 months into with 10 months remaining at \$11,002 per month. The City staff asks that the Commission approves for the City to pick up that remaining landscaping contract with Lawnsapcing. This will be reimbursable through the DEP grant. It requires a motion to approve the landscape contract. Mayor confirmed the cost of \$11,002 is reimbursable so will not cost the City. Attorney Obos confirmed the City will pay it first then claim it back monthly. Commissioner Tinder said she would like to get a bid from our current landscapers to compare. Kevin Obos said this is just for the remaining 10 months, so after that we can go forward with competitive bids. We do not have 30-45 days to let the park go into disrepair while we go get new bids. Commissioner Aldridge confirmed it is a beautiful park and the landscaping is superb, saying we have very little investment overall so he would make a motion to pick it up, to be reimbursed.

Motion by Commissioner Aldridge: That the City picks up the remaining 10 month landscaping contract, with money paid to refunded by DEP as claimed back monthly.

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Ryan Scray asked if the 10 months are already accounted for in the budget? If so, it is not like the City is not prepared for the spend. Attorney Obos advised that the DEP escrowed the funds from which the City will draw every month, along with the other additional maintenance costs.

Commissioner Tinder – The City has the lawn maintenance, and is insured, now any idea what the cost for labor is going to be regarding City employees. City Manager confirmed there are staff who want to be out there, and there is another part in the grant to provide for another 2.5 employees for the next 10 years, reaffirming that the City did budget for this park.

Item #21. Discussion and possible approval of street closures (Florida Avenue between 8th & 10th Streets) for a neighborhood block party special event.

The City Manager spoke to the item and invited any discussion and questions.

Commissioner Tinder asked for confirmation of closure times.

City Manager confirmed from Noon to 8pm

Mayor Nelson asked that after previous Memorial Day event issues, if this is approved today will it be grandfathered into the previous rules or go into the new one.

Attorney Obos confirmed it will be grandfathered in while the City works on the new permitting code.

Commissioner Tinder said she had questions for Mr. Scray. Mr. Scray walked to the podium and the Mayor asked him to take his seat again. The Commission continued discussion, then the Mayor invited Mr. Scray to approach the podium for questions. Mr. Scray queried why he could not speak to his item. Mayor advised he could speak to his item but not until invited to by the Chair.

Commissioner Perno asked if this is going to be an event for a nonprofit organization.

Scray advised he does not have a nonprofit organization but to keep it transparent he has set up an LLC and if this event is approved an account will be set up via Tyndall. He would be happy to sit and discuss with the Commission if they wish. He has many sponsors that have already verbally committed. He said that the PD and Fire Chiefs had both committed to have resources available

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through the City. He would be happy to meet any future permitting codes for this event if they were shared with him.

Commissioner Tinder asked what \$ value insurance he is going to be purchasing.

Ryan Scray advised at least \$1m umbrella insurance and would pursue more if the City required it. Commissioner Tinder asked if he was going to use the traffic cones and trash cans from the city

Ryan Scray confirmed yes. Commissioner Tinder queried about porter potties? Ryan Scray confirmed there are two places set aside for porter potties. Commissioner Tinder asked on insurance if there was additional insurance required for children's blow up facilities. City Manager said you can purchase your insurance through the companies renting them out. Ryan Scray confirmed they will arrange to have additional insurance through the inflatable companies, or he will get it with his insurer. Commissioner Tinder confirmed that they will not be selling alcohol. Ryan Scray confirmed correct, a lot of liability and licensing that goes with that. General public law will apply in terms of alcohol. Commissioner Tinder asked if there will be a Board of Directors to deal with any funds that are left over. Mr. Scray said he had not arranged anything of that sort and would like to emphasize he intends to remain in the area and try to make this an annual event. Commissioner Tinder asked if Mr. Scray was the only owner of the LLC what happens if he moves away? Ryan Scray said he would transfer the company to someone locally.

Item #22. Discussion and possible approval of change of commission meeting times.

Commissioner Warrick spoke to the item and the history behind the various changes in time that have occurred, stating that the Commission meeting is a residents meeting. In order to have committees we have to have people involved and engaged. He feels it is key to get this meeting time right to get people involved in the City business.

Commissioner Aldridge said he does not take any of it personally, and he does not plan how he can disrupt the citizens. He went on to say that we all have different spheres of influence, and his sphere of influence is with the parents of his daughters' friends and at their activities. From the people that he speaks to in his sphere, they all want to cook dinner at 6pm and put children in baths etc. He stated that all of us are citizens, and some demographics want an early evening meeting. At the end of the day, he is one vote, not a dictator. It is up to the vote of the majority of the Commission. Either way he will be here at the meetings.

Commissioner Tinder said she also received many emails this week, even from some people who want both meetings to be at 5.30pm and eliminate the 9am one but felt to be fair to everyone we should consider having one morning meeting and one evening meeting.

Commissioner Warrick asked if the big concern is the seniors and the darkness at nights. Commissioner Aldridge confirmed yes.

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Commissioner Perno stated that as he said before he does not mind which time. His last vote was to let us try 4pm, stating that we have only had two meetings at the new time so far and they've both been well attended.

Commissioner Warrick said he does not want to try different times but would like to make the times as permanent as they can, and he wants to find the right balance.

Motion by Commissioner Warrick: To approve change of commission meeting times to have one at 4pm and one at 5pm.

Mr. Miller 1408 Mississippi Avenue spoke about the trouble the seniors have attending late meetings. He remembers in previous later meeting hardly anyone attended. He went on to tell Commissioner Warrick that he remembers when he did his survey and went past his house and did not stop and knock. Commissioner Warrick apologized and said he tried to make it to every single house and is happy to speak to him after the meeting.

Jodi Moore of 2129 Emhurst Street spoke about how she understands there is no perfect time but felt all 9am meetings would not be good for invalids and elderly people. She then wanted to speak again about Chief Ramie's Facebook post and said that Kevin Obos keeps referring to 1st amendment on face book page and continues to ignore the WMBB tv report which came up. Most companies have employee policy about representing the entity you work for, and if the City does not follow its own policy, it may as well tear it up.

Ryan Scray said Commissioner Warrick and I agree on a lot, but I do not agree with you on this one for these reasons. I do not think you are addressing both sides of the public. I will be missing the kickball meetings in the evenings if it is moved to 5pm and I am okay with that.

George Hines 1603 Rhode Island Avenue said the meeting so far has been two hours, and if we start 6pm people would only be leaving at 8pm, or 9pm after they travel home. He went on to say that if the 9am meeting is a problem because of Mr. Warrick's employment then that is something he should sort out himself. As for the lady that said she cannot get up by 9am in the morning, he does not know why because he gets up at 5.30am every day. He said we need to have one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

Sue Hendricks of 3407 Chairidge Road said her concern is most seniors have eye vision problems and cannot drive at night, it is blinding. She said a meeting starting late ends even later, asking if others are going to drive them home? In the winter months, dark is at 7pm. She asked that they please keep it at 4pm at least at 6pm she can still get home.

Jodi Moore approached the podium again and the Mayor advised her she could not speak again because she had already used her time. She said she knows but just wanted to say something anyway. She proceeded to go out of order and ignored the Mayor's many requests to take her seat and not speak. She then turned her back on the Commission and addressed the public directly, laughing and giggling disrespectfully ignoring the Commission, saying she had 3 spare seats in her car for any elderly ladies who needed a ride later at night, and that 6pm was not the proposal.

Mayor Nelson advised that after you make comments on an agenda item you cannot come back and make additional comments on the same item.

Mr. Walker asked what happens to the evenings when we are forced by state law to be here after 5.01, or the days when we are told by municipal law that we cannot meet on those days. Why is there a law that says we have to be here at 5.01pm? Because people have to get off work.

Jerri Parker Rett Place said she would like both meetings to be in the evening, but the key word here is compromise. If the seniors want to have it a 9am fine, then lets have the other at 5.30pm. She went on to address the ethics clause, but the Attorney interrupted her saying that item could not be taken out of order and be addressed under this item. She said okay she would bring it up at the next meeting.

Glenda Butler 415 Montana Avenue said she is retired and a volunteer. She cannot make most of

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the meetings at 9am in the morning. If most of the seniors need a ride she can help, but she has to have an evening meeting otherwise she cannot come.

Commissioner Tinder said she would like to ask Commissioner Warrick to amend his motion for 9am & 5.30pm meeting.

Attorney Obos advised that if we do need to change the meeting times it must be by resolution, and the City will also have to readvertise for the ordinances that are being advertised currently, if the commencement date is too soon. He recommends a motion to bring back a resolution to the next meeting.

Commissioner Aldridge wanted to confirm they are asking to do away with 9am altogether.

Commissioner Perno asked if Commissioner Warrick wanted to amend his motion to one meeting at 9am and one at 5.30pm.

Commissioners continued to discuss the timing issue for a while longer.

Commissioner Tinder said she supported a 9am and 5.30pm as preferable to her for working people.

Amended motion by Commissioner Warrick Authorizing the Mayor to sign a resolution, prepared by staff, changing the commission meetings to be one meeting at 9am and one at 5.30pm, beginning from July 1st 2021.
Second to the Motion Commissioner Tinder

A member of the public said she would like to see the 9am and 5.30pm meeting times.

Commissioner Warrick said he really hopes this works for everyone and we get many people attending in the future.
